3. Instilling Professional Attitudes and Values and Service Accountability

Through discussion and case studies, supervisors guide students to develop professional attitudes and values as well as service accountability.

Teaching/Learning Methodology

(*Note 3*)

By means of weekly supervision, live supervision and on-site observation, students are coached by their supervisors to practice generic case, group and community work and the skills required. Through discussions and real case examples, supervisors guide students to develop their self-understanding, professional attitudes and values, as well as service accountability. Preparatory and integrative workshops are conducted to help students consolidate the integration of theories and practice. During weekly supervisory meetings, students' performance is discussed and their active participation is encouraged. At mid-placement evaluation, supervisors provide verbal feedback to students. Towards the end of the placement, a formal evaluation session is held.
