Dr Gail Forey Awarded President's Award for Excellent Performance/Achievement in Teaching



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Sharing by Dr Gail Forey

I'd like to say how honoured I am to receive this award. They often say in teaching we teach how we were taught. I'm not sure that's so true. I've been lucky enough to be taught by some inspirational teachers. In fact, that is why I'm standing here today. It was one particular teacher at secondary school that influenced me and helped to open doors that lead to where I stand today. Teachers can and do make a difference! I believe in teaching. We learn from others, by watching others and by working with others. I'm lucky that I'm surrounded by great teachers, and currently two inspirational leaders Christian Matthiessen and Xu Xunfeng, thank you both. In our Department we have a great team, and I'd like to share this award with all the outstanding teachers I have had the privilege to work with here in the Department of English and elsewhere!

I've been teaching at PolyU since 1995, an incredible 20 years which seem to have flashed by in an instant. I love my work, I love my students, and I love teaching. I believe my job as a teacher is to provide opportunities to every student, to support them in whatever way I can to help them develop, become more knowledgeable, and become better people.

As the Programme Leader for the Master of Arts in English Language Teaching, I work very closely with teachers. And as an applied linguist, discourse analyst and teacher, I have increasingly become interested in language as the primary resource for meaning making in the classroom. I have been extremely fortunate to work with John Polias and Bette Li, providing professional development workshops for teachers with a focus on teaching through English, disciplinary literacy and pedagogy. We have been awarded over 8 million dollars in funds to run seven projects, offering workshops and support to over 500 local teachers - Technology, Physical Education, Art, Science teachers as well as a general introduction to Academic English. As part of this work, John, Bette and myself have all given plenary presentations and have supported some of the teachers who attended the workshops to share their best practice with others at these Sharing Sessions. There have been over 750 teachers attending the three Sharing Sessions. Through these workshops we have conducted research, which has entailed further practical benefits for teachers. We've developed the teaching

learning cycle as a pedagogical approach that is applicable to all disciplines. We've also published papers and are currently working on a research project and a book together.

For me it is the engagement, the mental stimulation and the laughter that I get from teaching and working with students and colleagues in the Department that has resulted in me loving the work I do. There are many other deserving teachers who excel in their work and inspire their students, and carrying out research in the classroom. I hope to learn from them. Finally, a thank you to my students and colleagues who nominated me for this award!

Sharing of the ELC Team on ERW (English Reading and Writing)

Up until 2013, the implementation model of the university-wide ERW programme was developed and coordinated solely by Ms Shari Dureshrawar Lughmani with Ms Gigi Au Yeung as Project Associate from the English Language Centre (ELC). The decision by the University to upscale the programme because of its positive impact on students' written abilities, however, led to the need for a team that would shoulder the expanded responsibilities and assist in the management of the programme. The first team was composed of seven members and was formed in late 2013. This team won the Faculty Award for services. Members of the award-winning team were:

The current team carries on the tradition, has expanded to cater for an even bigger student population and meets on a regular basis through semesters and semester breaks.

Its major responsibilities have been to:

- 1. negotiate writing assignment details with subject lecturers
- 2. develop assignment instructions, draft checklists and genre guides
- 3. liaise with subject lecturers throughout the semester and answer their queries
- 4. communicate with students throughout the semester and answer their queries

Through its caring and collaborative approach to communication with the various departments across the University, and its continuous search for better resources and services to enhance students' writing abilities across the curriculum, the team has won the hearts and minds of the subject teachers who can witness the cognitive/intellectual gains that their students have been able to demonstrate through their writings supported by the ELC's Writing Requirement Team.

Students generally perceived their writing ability to have improved compared with other students before and after having taken the writing requirement with the ELC. When answering the question, "What did you do to improve your writing?" (as a result of the feedback), students mentioned having addressed issues including those related to style, proof-reading, audience awareness, grammar, considering teachers' suggestions carefully in organising ideas and enriching the content, and using a variety of sources.

Feedback from CAR subject teachers has been very positive. Some quotations below provide the most valued aspects.

How has this experience changed your perceptions about your students' reading and writing practices?

Before, I was appalled at students' writing ability and put it down to a combination of English weakness and muddled thinking. Now I put it down to not enough small group or one-to-one contact with English writing experts. Now, I don't think their problems were due to grammar weakness. Maybe part of the problem is due to poor English/English teaching in schools.

How did the process of working with the ELC on the Writing Requirement task affect your teaching practice/thinking?

I am more confident in the students' abilities all-round (This collaboration) reinforces my impression that the students can excel once they are told the 'how' as well as the 'what'... Now I just have to spell out the requirements, expectations, topics and questions at the beginning of the semester, and don't have to worry whether the students are making constant progress with their writing. In the past I asked the students to take turns to do individual presentation in the

tutorial, and the presentation topics were the same as their essay topics. The allocation of topics has usually been a difficulty, as students were required to share the topics more or less evenly, and some students had to present much earlier than other students. It was difficult to take care of student interest and disparity of presentation time simultaneously. Now by putting the writing task on a fixed path [with the ELC], I can disconnect the [subject] tutorial from the writing assignment.

Based on its sterling work, its dedication to the PolyU community and its constant striving for excellence, the team has won recognition throughout the University and has made the role of English felt among the learning, teaching and research community of PolyU.

MOOC - English@Work in Asia: Job applications



Have you heard about MOOCs? A MOOC is a Massive Online Open Course; it is massive - thousands of students enrol in the courses; it is generally 100% online although increasingly face to face elements are built into the courses; it is usually open to anyone in the world free of charge.

PolyU is launching a series of MOOCs on the eDX platform in the coming year, with the English Language Centre's (ELC's) MOOC, English@Work in Asia: Job applications, scheduled to get underway in the 4th quarter of 2015. A small team from the ELC is hard at work producing new videos and online content for the course.

English@Work in Asia: Job applications will cover the skills needed to successfully apply for a job in Asia and is divided into two parts. Part A of the course covers areas including writing, formatting and customising effective CVs and job application letters, while Part B analyses interacting professionally and persuasively in a job interview. The importance of an applicant's online presence when applying for jobs is also emphasized in this course.

The teaching input of English@Work in Asia: Job applications will be based around a series of short videos and texts. Participants will be assessed using a range of automated assessment tools, while participation in discussions and wikis, and peer assessment of participants' work will also count towards the final grade. Training will be provided to all participants before peer assessments, and a sample of work will also be graded by the course leaders to ensure grading reliability.

The target audience are graduates and young professionals looking for jobs in Asia which require English language skills. Both native and non-native speakers of English will benefit from taking the course.


New TPg programmes

The Four Books and Modern Chinese Culture



The lecture "The Four Books and Modern Chinese Culture" (《四書》與近世中國文化簡介) by Prof. Chu Hung-lam, Interim Dean of Faculty of Humanities was held on 20 March 2015. The lecture was broadcasted by the Radio and Television of Hong Kong as a part of the programme "Knowledge Platform" (大學堂) in three parts in March and April 2015. The programme introduced topics on liberal studies directly from the lecture halls of Hong Kong's universities. Prof. Chu talked about the naming origin of The Four Books - Great Learning, Doctrine of the Mean, Analects and Mencius - and the main ideas of each book. He also explained why The Four Books became classics in Confucianism, and illustrated the impact of these books on Chinese political thoughts and cultural ideals as well as their significance in modern times.



Ten years of support and consultancy for FCC/PLK language programmes

ELC Consultancy to the Community: Po Leung Kuk Language Programmes

Since writing our last article in the FH newsletter in 2012, we have broken through the ten-year barrier of arguably the most sustainable Outreach programme on campus.

The English Language Centre (ELC) remains steadfast on supporting language programmes with the specific aim to stem inter-generational poverty in Hong Kong by helping over 300 children in Po Leung Kuk residential care homes as well as another 550 children from needy homes in Lei Muk Shue and Tai Wai.

These projects founded by collaboration between Po Leung Kuk (PLK) and the Foreign Correspondents' Club rely heavily on corporate sponsorship from UBS, Bank of America/Merrill Lynch and the Sprouts Foundation, which now exceeds HKD 15,000,000 a year.

Our role has now expanded from the provision of consultancy services such as management, recruitment, curriculum design and evaluation, as we are now in our second year of providing comprehensive observations for the near 100 teaching staff. Many ELC staff volunteer to take part in these which ensures that we satisfy our remit: to safeguard the programmes.

So how successful are the programmes? Many students have improved at school and have added confidence but more importantly many are gaining university places and will hopefully break the poverty cycle.

- The students learn a lot of social skills here because the groups are small, very mixed and diverse and there is room for them to make mistakes and learn from them. The staffs are very supportive and the kids are happy.



Kyung Hee University Student Programme

Research Interests of New Academic Staff Members



Department of Chinese and Bilingual StudiesDr Si Chen, Research Assistant Professor

Dr Si Chen's research interests lie in Phonetics, Phonology and statistical modeling. Her recent research focuses on finding effective statistical models in testing the tone sandhi phenomenon, which can represent the perception of native speakers mostly, and also proposes phonological tonal categories based on statistical modeling of phonetic data. Effective models are also used to compare native and non-native speakers' production in tone sandhi. Her current projects also involve using simulated data from estimated population distribution in testing tonal normalization ability in Cantonese speakers and training in non-native speakers. Dr Si Chen is presenting her paper "Phonological representations of underlying tonal targets based on statistical modeling in tonal languages" at the International Conference on Prosodic Studies: Challenges and Prospects in June 2015. Her paper "Tone realisation in younger vs. older speakers of Nanjing Dialect" is published in Zhuo, Jing-Schmidt (ed.) Increased Empiricism: Recent Advances in Chinese Linguistics. Amsterdam/Philadelphia: John Benjamins.



Department of Chinese and Bilingual StudiesDr Caicai Zhang, Assistant Professor

Dr Caicai Zhang's research work centres on the neural mechanisms of speech production and perception, with a focus on the Chinese language and lexical tone. She has used behavioural and neuroimaging methods such as EEG and fMRI to investigate the cognitive processes underlying speech production and perception, and the critical neural activities sub-serving those cognitive processes. She has been doing three lines of research: (1) speaker variability in speech signals and the neural mechanisms of how listeners manage to perceptually accommodate speaker variability; (2) the neural mechanisms (phonological computation vs. lexical access) of the online encoding of tone sandhi in Mandarin in speech production; and (3) the relationship of language and music, from the perspective of how congenital amusia (an inborn music disability) affects language performance in terms of tone production and tone perception.

She has published 11 research articles in high-impact journals, including NeuroImage; Brain and Language; Journal of NeuroIinguistics; Journal of Speech, Language, and Hearing Research; Journal of the Acoustical Society of America; and Journal of Chinese Linguistics. She has also authored three book chapters, and the most recent one is on tone perception in Oxford Handbook of Chinese Linguistics.

Inaugural articles of Lingua Sinica

The first articles of Lingua Sinica*, the first Open Access international journal dedicated to languages and linguistics of China, were published. The five inaugural articles cover a range of key areas of research in Chinese linguistics taking empirical approaches with interdisciplinary perspectives:

- Prof. Chu-Ren Huang, in a tribute to the 60th anniversary of Y.R. Chao's seminal paper, 'Notes on Chinese Grammar and Logic', introduces the ontological concept of endurant/perdurant to account for the grammatical category system of classifier in Chinese.
- Jingxia Lin proposes a Motion Morpheme Hierarchy for Mandarin Chinese verb compounds that predicts the order of verbal morphemes in motion constructions as found in natural Chinese corpora.
- Sze Wing Tang examines utterance particles in Mandarin and Cantonese, and tag statements in English, to argue for a generalized syntactic schema in which sentence final expressions are not heads.
- Zhiguo Xie looks at the epistemic and metaphysical readings of non-root modals in English (e.g., John might have won...) to elucidate the phenomena of backshifting in temporal perspective as found with Mandarin aspectual adverbs like 仍 reng and 還 hai.
- Finally, Henry Y. Chang analyses the Austronesian 'focus/voice' system according to the Minimalist Program's phase theory to address the extraction of internal arguments of Tsou applicatives.

New Corpus - Corpus of Translational English

The joint ESRC (UK) – RGC (Hong Kong) research project, "Comparable and Parallel Corpus Approaches to the Third Code: English and Chinese Perspectives" (ES/K010107/1), has supported the construction of a new corpus, the Corpus of Translational English (COTE), which is a one-million-word balanced comparable corpus of translated English texts, designed as a translational counterpart of the Freiburg–LOB Corpus of British English (F-LOB). The project is led by Dr Richard Xiao and Dr Andrew Hardie at The ESRC Centre for Corpus Approaches to Social Science (CASS) in collaboration with Dr Li Dechao and Prof. Huang Chu-ren at The Hong Kong Polytechnic University.

Hong Kong PhD Fellowship

Established by the Research Grants Council (RGC) of Hong Kong in 2009, the Hong Kong PhD Fellowship Scheme (HKPFS) aims at attracting the best and brightest students in the world to pursue their PhD studies in Hong Kong's institutions.


It is hoped that the symposium would help students refine their current research work and stimulate innovative ideas and insights and that the symposium provided the students with an opportunity to enhance their presentation skills and to gain experience of participating in conferences.

HKAH First Book Prize - Outstanding Finalist

Dr Dennis Zhiming Tay, Assistant Professor (Department of English), is awarded the prize of Outstanding Finalist in the 2013-2014 Hong Kong Academy of the Humanities' First Book Prize. In addition to Dr Tay, Dr Mable Chan, Research Assistant Professor (Department of English), is also among the five finalists for the prize.

Dr Tay's book, entitled *Metaphor in psychotherapy. A descriptive and prescriptive analysis* is published by John Benjamins in the Metaphor in Language, Cognition, and Communication series in 2013. The prize reviewing committee finds that he writes with admirable clarity, economy, and precision, and that he argues cogently and convincingly for the function of metaphors in the change of mental perspective or behaviour. Overall the work produces compelling evidence that metaphor research has application to the metaphoric ideation and development figuring in the 'talking cure' of psychotherapy.

International Conference on English Across the Curriculum 2015



The International Conference on English Across the Curriculum will be held from 14 to 15 December 2015 at The Hong Kong Polytechnic University. This two-day conference aims to bring together academics from different disciplines and language teaching units to explore ways of enhancing students' English in discipline content subjects.


The 5th PolySystemic Language & Education Symposium & Workshops



Enrico Santus was awarded the Distinguished Young Paper Award for the paper titled "Unsupervised Antonym-Synonym Discrimination in Vector Space", written by Enrico Santus, Prof. Lu Qin, Prof. Alessandro Lenci and Prof. Huang Chu-Ren, at the Italian Conference on Computational Linguistics (CLiC-it) (http://clic.humnet.unipi.it/en/index.html), which took place in Pisa, Italy, 9 - 10 December 2014. As part of the award, an extended version of the paper will be published in a journal.

Sharing by Enrico:

Can a computer pass the TOEFL test? Yes, it can. Or, at least, it can pass the multiple-choice synonyms questions with a score of 92.5 %. Not bad, if you consider that the human average is only 64.5 %! Thanks to the statistical approaches to language, in fact, computers are progressing in understanding how words are related to each other. My research at The Hong Kong Polytechnic University is exactly about teaching computers to learn automatically these relations. The awarded paper, in particular, was about teaching computers how to automatically distinguish synonyms from opposites. Given their impressive performances, will computers ever teach us to distinguish the good and the bad?
