The activity created bonding among all participants, and our colleagues and research students enjoyed making the delicious drinks.

The Asia Pacific Emergency and Disaster Nursing Network (APEDNN) Annual Conference 2018

As the Co-Secretariat of APEDNN, the School and the Faculty of Nursing, Mahidol University, Thailand, jointly organised the Asia Pacific Emergency and Disaster Nursing Network (APEDNN) Annual Conference 2018, on 15 to 16 November 2018, in Siem Reap, Kingdom of Cambodia. The Ministry of Health, Kingdom of Cambodia, was the co-organiser of this conference.

With the theme "Disaster Capacity and Resilience Building: Nursing Contributions", the conference provided a unique regional platform for sharing vision on emergency and disaster nursing, exchanging new ideas, and strengthening collaborations and networks.

Prof. Alex Molasiotis, Head of the School, and Advisor of the APEDNN; Prof. Yajai Sittimongkol, Dean, Faculty of Nursing, Mahidol University, Thailand, and Advisor of the APEDNN; and HE Prof. Thir Kruy, Secretary of State, Ministry of Health, Kingdom of Cambodia, delivered the opening remarks to kick off the conference.

In the two day conference, speakers led the participants to review the role of nurses in disasters, to explore how to develop nursing curricula and training programmes for nurturing resilience-oriented nursing professionals, and to find ways to enhance capacity building in disaster management. Topics such as Psychosocial Distress of Disaster Responders; Climate Variability and Health Resilience were covered. An expert panel discussion on capacity and resilience building was held to give participants different perspectives and in-depth understanding of the theme.

Prof. Alice Yuen Loke, Professor and Associate Head of the School of Nursing, and Co-Secretariat of the APEDNN; Dr Orapan Thosingha, Head, Department of Surgical Nursing, Faculty of Nursing, Mahidol University, Thailand, and Co-Secretariat of the APEDNN; HE Dr Vandine Or, Director General of Technical General Department, Ministry of Health, Kingdom of Cambodia, delivered the closing remarks marking the finish of another successful conference.

The inaugural ceremony/seminar of the Hong Kong Office of the Asia Health Literacy Association (AHLA) was held on 14 January 2019.

Prof. Alex Molasiotis, Head of the School, gave a welcoming address to kick off the event. The inaugural ceremony was officiated by Prof. Alex Molasiotis, Prof. Terence Ming-Che Tsai (Immediate Past President, Asia Health Literacy Association; Dean/Professor, College of Medicine, Chung Shan Medical University, Taiwan), and **Dr Angela Leung**, Founding member, AHLA Hong Kong Office.

Prof. Terence Ming-Che Tsai was invited to give a congratulatory remarks and presented the Health Literacy Leadership Award. Prof. Don Nutbeam, Professor of Public Health, School of Public Health, University of Sydney, gave the keynote speech. Five seminar sessions and a round-table meeting were held following the keynote speech.

The Hong Kong office of the AHLA aims to improve health literacy skills and promote a better understanding and utilisation of health literacy strategies among health professionals to reduce health inequalities.

The HK Health Literacy Core Team of the Office is mainly consisted of academic scholars from local universities. A MPhil student and a PhD student of SN PolyU also join the team. Members work together to discuss current health literacy issues, research and practices, and collaboratively conduct projects and advocate for implementation of health literacy research findings into practice.

The Hong Kong office is open to patients, researchers, health educators, health professionals, policy makers, non-governmental organizations, media personnel and everyone who are interested in or passionate about health literacy.

Staff members are Co-Investigators of a 3 million international project

Dr Tella Lantta visited the School between 31 August 2017 and 1 March 2018 as a Visiting Postdoctoral Fellow. Beside her other duties at the Mental Health Care team, she prepared a grant application for her post-doctoral period. In January 2019, the Academy of Finland awarded her with the Postdoctoral Researcher funding for her international project "Development and Testing the Effectiveness and Feasibility of a Structured Violence Risk Management Intervention to Support Safety in Psychiatric Hospitals". **Dr Paul Lee** and **Prof. Maritta Valimaki** are Co-Investigators of this study. The total funding granted for the project is about HKD 3 million (339,731 Euros).

Seminar on music-with-movement activities created an impact on care for cognitive impairment

The research team led by **Dr Daphne Cheung** and **Dr Claudia Lai** organised a public seminar entitled "Music-with-Movement Activities for Older People with Mild or Early Cognitive Impairment and Their Caregivers" on 26 October 2018.

The team received an overwhelming registration with over 400 registrants. Three hundred registrants were caregivers of older adults. They found that the intervention was interesting and useful.

Professional registrants (e.g., nurses, social workers and occupational therapists) showed their interest to learn more about the intervention and suggested integrating the intervention into their routine care.



Research Themes & Centres Update

Ageing and Health



Congress on long term care & gerontology and seminar on cross-border elderly care

The Centre and Hong Kong Association of Gerontology co-organised the the 15th World Congress on Long Term Care in Chinese Communities cum 25th Annual Congress of Gerontology & 7th Cross-border Elderly Care Seminar on 29 November to 1 December 2018 at PolyU. The event brought together around 700 academics, policy makers, and practitioners from Mainland China, Taiwan, Macau, Hong Kong, Australia and the USA to participate. The CGN took the lead to organise two nursing symposiums, namely Gerontechnology and Nursing Care and Symptom Management, and a pain management workshop.



Dr Rick Kwan led his students to win the 2nd runner-up in the outstanding paper presentations in the World Congress. The paper titled "The Predictors for Transitions of Frailty Status among Older Adults in Hong Kong: A 5-year Longitudinal Study" was a secondary analysis using the Centre's frailty dataset.

The presenting student, Mr Ka-shun Wong, a year-5 student on the BSc (Hons) in Mental Health Nursing programme, is the first-ever awardee of the CGN Young Researcher Scholarship. The scholarship supports students to achieve high academic standard and present their work in regional/international conferences.



Family and Community Health



Certificate Course in Infectious Diseases and Infection Control for Health Care Professionals 2019

Forty-three students enrolled in the Certificate Course in Infectious Diseases and Infection Control for Health Care Professionals 2019 organised by the Centre.

The course was accredited by the Hong Kong Council for Accreditation of Academic and Vocational Qualifications (HKCAAVQ,香港學術及職業資歷評審局) in 2018 and is recognised as a Level 4 continuing education course of 12 credits.

The course includes three comprehensive sub-modules with a flexible schedule. Clinical microbiology laboratory sessions and clinical visits to hospitals will be organised to enrich student learning experience. Students with satisfactory attendance will be awarded 92 CNE points. The course was rigorously reviewed and it adheres to a strict quality assurance process of the Quality Assurance Council of the University.

Member received the Oral Audience Award

Ms Jacqueline Ho received the Oral Audience Award in the Learning in Alliance: Inter-Professional Health Education and Practice at Frontiers in Medical and Health Sciences Education 2018, held on 18-19 December 2018.

In her presentation, Ms Ho shared the results of a qualitative study on experiences of undergraduate students undertaking interprofessional team-based learning activities. The co-authors of the study are Dr Arnold Wong (the Department of Rehabilitation Sciences) and **Prof. Frances Wong**.

First Town Hall Meeting-Sharing of career aspiration after a PhD

The School organised its first Town Hall Meeting on 7 December 2018 to provide an opportunity for our PhD graduates to share their perspectives and experiences of how their PhD launched new careers, and for our current research students to discuss career aspirations after a PhD.

The four PhD graduates were: Dr Benjamin Tan, Assistant Dean for International Affairs & Senior Lecturer in Nursing, College of Nursing and Midwifery, Charles Darwin University, Australia (sharing with our students via video conference); Dr Connie Chong, Postdoctoral Fellow at the Faculty of Social Sciences, The University of Hong Kong; Dr Ken Ho, Assistant Professor at the School of Nursing, Tung Wah College; Dr Rick Kwan, Assistant Professor at the School of Nursing, PolyU.

Dr Doris Leung, Teaching Fellow and research postgraduate programme coordinator of the School was the facilitator of the meeting. Prof. Maritta Valimaki, Associate Head in Research (& Professor), Chairperson of the School Research Committee, supported and attended the event. Around 20 people participated in the meeting.

In the meeting, tips were provided by the graduates to help the students on their PhD journey. These included the importance of prioritizing the life between family life, leisure and study; developing a good schedule for the study plan; seeking mentors and collaborators; gaining overseas study experience or attending international conferences for networking; exploring small grants and bursaries, and developing an understanding of the philosophy behind the methodology of the PhD project, etc.

Reflecting on his PhD journey, Dr Tan said that it was very important to put the confirmation and course work as the major focus in the first year of the PhD study and he urged the students to strike a balance between the publication plan and their PhD work. Dr Ho suggested that the students should get used to failure (for example, when a submission to a publication was rejected).

The graduates suggested that the students should acquire experience in teaching, research and engage in professional services and contribute to research communities, if they are preparing for an academic career, as these are the selection criteria for recruiting academic staff members.

Dr Chong, who chose to enter a research career in the field of Social Sciences, shared her career aspiration and the challenges of leading a multidisciplinary research team in a non-nursing faculty. The experience has informed her the importance of having effective communication and project management skills. She learnt how to appreciate the perspectives of others and this has expanded her horizon. She is collaborating with some local institutions and non-governmental organisations, and she told our students that it was crucial to learn how to disseminate the research knowledge to other people so that they understood the impact of the research.

Dr Kwan shared how he took the opportunities to attach to universities overseas to enhance his teaching and research knowledge. He also talked about how he overcame barriers and transited from Clinical Associate to Assistant Professor. Our research students found the meeting useful as it provided a valuable opportunity for them to learn from and exchange ideas with our graduates.

Sharing from UK exchange students

In September 2018, three master's students from City, University of London exchanged to the School for an intensive one-week programme. Nicole Seneque and David Kiy, two of the exchange students, talked more about their experience:

What was your experience of the exchange programme?

David: I came at this exchange from a slightly different angle as I used to live in Mainland China and have Chinese family. I found it interesting seeing the mix of Chinese and British culture within the healthcare system. It was interesting to see some of the issues that we struggle with are similar in HK. For example trying to deal with the stigma and a lack of resources for mental health. I also really enjoyed experiencing a university environment in HK and the lectures on traditional Chinese medicine and pain management.

How will your participation in the programme benefit your further studies/ nursing career?

Nicole: For me, it was to see healthcare in a different part of the world. Last summer, I volunteered as a student nurse in Tanzania, so HK gave me a completely different experience. All experiences have made me value the NHS even more than I did. My experiences will help me relate to patients from different countries, cultures and religions. It also adds strength to your CV because it makes you stand out a little bit.

David: This exchange highlighted to me how lucky nurses are in the UK in terms of opportunities for developing skills and advanced practice. For example, nurses in HK cannot prescribe. Equally how initial training in the UK is much less than HK. They cover adult, child and basic midwifery as part of their five-year initial training. This encourages me to continue learning in future and to appreciate opportunities for advanced practice.

Would you recommend the exchange programme to future nursing students?

Nicole: Definitely yes. We went to a really interesting evening lecture on pain management, listened to master's students presenting their research projects, visited a number of hospitals (including a drug and alcohol dependency unit, a learning disability ward, general adults and mental health wards. We got to visit their clinical skills labs where there was one for each of the areas of the curriculum e.g. older adult care and the Intensive Care Unit.

David: I would strongly recommend this exchange to future nursing students. Seeing other ways of training and practising helps us see the good points in what we do and areas to improve. Experiencing other cultures helps us understand our patients and appreciate their cultural differences. Finally, travelling abroad with classmates helps build closer ties, which are so beneficial when we begin working as nurses.


